The facility of casting votes by the members using an electronic voting system from a place other than venue of the AGM ("Remote e-Voting") will be provided by Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL), <https://www.evotingindia.com> which would enable members to cast their vote electronically on all the items of businesses given in the Notice of AGM. The Remote e-Voting period shall commence on Tuesday, 9th September, 2025 at 9.00 A.M. and end on Thursday, 11th September, 2025 at 5.00 P.M. During this period, members of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on 5th September, 2025 ("cut-off date") may cast their votes electronically.

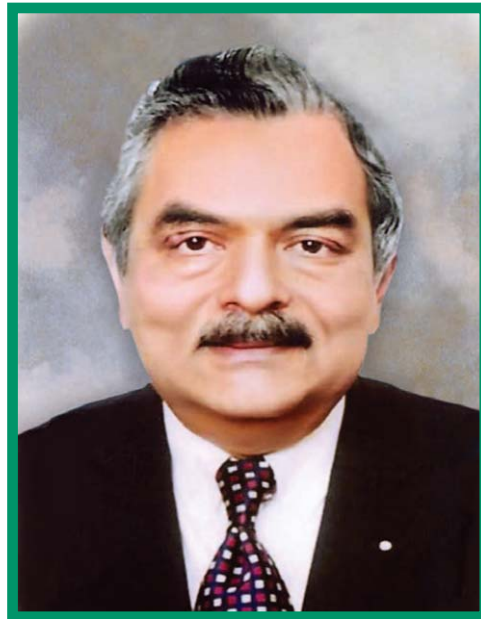

NOTES FOR MEMBERS' ATTENTION

1. The Statement setting out all material facts relating to the Special Business to be transacted at the Annual General Meeting pursuant to Section 102(1) of the Companies Act, 2013 is annexed hereto.
2. **A MEMBER ENTITLED TO ATTEND AND VOTE AT THE AGM IS ENTITLED TO APPOINT A PROXY TO ATTEND AND VOTE ON A POLL INSTEAD OF HIMSELF OR HERSELF AND THE PROXY NEED NOT BE A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY.**
The instrument appointing Proxies, in order to be effective, must be received in the annexed Proxy Form at the Registered Office of the Company not less than forty eight (48) hours before the time fixed for commencement of the AGM, i.e. by 10.00 A.M. on September 10, 2025.
A person shall not act as Proxy on behalf of members for more than Fifty (50) in number and holding in the aggregate not more than ten percent of the total share capital of the Company carrying voting rights. A member holding more than ten percent of the total share capital of the Company carrying voting rights may appoint a single person as proxy and such person shall not act as proxy for any other person or member.
3. Members/Proxies are requested to deposit the Attendance Slip duly filled in and signed for attending the AGM. In case of joint holders attending the AGM, only one such joint holder whose name appears first in the joint holders list will be entitled to vote. Corporate members, Societies, etc. intending to attend the AGM through their authorised representatives are requested to send to the Company, a certified copy of the Board Resolution, Power of Attorney or such other valid authorisations, authorising them to attend and vote on their behalf at the AGM. Members who hold shares in dematerialised form are requested to bring their DP ID and Client ID Number for easier identification of attendance at the AGM.
4. During the period beginning twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for the commencement of the AGM and ending with the conclusion of the AGM, a Member would be entitled to inspect the proxies lodged at any time during the business hours of the Company. All relevant documents referred to in the accompanying Notice and the Statement shall be open for inspection by the Members at the Registered Office of the Company during normal business hours on all working days except Saturdays, upto and including the date of the AGM. The Register of Directors and Key Managerial Personnel and their shareholding maintained under Section 170 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Register of Contracts or Arrangements in which Directors are interested, maintained under Section 189 of the Companies Act, 2013 will be available for inspection during the AGM at the Registered Office of the Company.
5. Members of the Company had approved appointment of M/s V. Sankar Aiyer & Co., Chartered Accountants, as the Statutory Auditors at the Thirtieth (30th) AGM of the Company held on September 23, 2022 for a term of five (5) consecutive years until the conclusion of Thirty fifth (35th) AGM of the Company to be held for the financial year 2026-27 as per the provisions of Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, as amended.
6. The Company has fixed September 5, 2025 as the "Record Date" for the purpose of the AGM.
7. Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) vide its various Circulars issued from time to time, to the Registrar and Share Transfer Agents has specified Common and Simplified Norms for processing Investor's Service Requests. The members holding shares in Physical form are mandatorily require to record their PAN, KYC i.e. Address with PIN Code, Mobile Number, Bank Account details, Specimen Signatures etc. along with Nomination details with the Company/Registrar and Share Transfer Agents (RTA) of the Company. Further, the security holders (holding securities in physical form), whose folio(s) do not have PAN or Contact Details or Mobile Number or Bank Account Details or Specimen Signature updated, shall be eligible for any payment including dividend, interest or redemption in respect of such folios, only through electronic mode with effect from April 1, 2024, upon their furnishing all the aforesaid details in entirety.

Members may please note that:

- (a) In case of Non-updation of PAN or Contact Details or Mobile Number or Bank Account Details or Specimen Signature in respect of physical folios, dividend / interest etc. shall be paid only through electronic mode with effect from April 1, 2024 upon furnishing all the aforesaid details in entirety.
- (b) If a security holder updates the PAN, Contact Details including Mobile Number, Bank Account Details and Specimen Signature after April 1, 2024, then the security holder would receive all the dividends/interest etc. declared during that period (from April 1, 2024 till date of updation) pertaining to the securities held after the said updation automatically.

The Company has sent necessary communication in this regard to all the members holding shares in Physical mode. The relevant formats for updation of PAN, KYC and Nomination details viz. Forms ISR-1, ISR-2, ISR-3, SH-13, SH-14 are available on Company's website as well as the website of RTA.

In view of the above, we request you to submit the PAN, KYC and Nomination details at the earliest to the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agents, MUFG Intime India Private Limited.

8. SEBI vide its Circular dated January 25, 2022, as amended, has mandated the listed companies to issue securities in dematerialized form only while processing service requests viz. issue of duplicate securities certificate; claim from unclaimed suspense account; renewal/exchange of securities certificate; endorsement; sub-division/splitting of securities certificate;

consolidation of securities certificates/folios; transmission and transposition. Accordingly, Members are requested to make service requests by submitting a duly filled and signed Form ISR – 4, the format of which is available on the Company's website and on the website of the Registrar and Share Transfer Agents (RTA) of the Company. It may be noted that any service request can be processed only after the folio is KYC Compliant.

9. SEBI has established a common Online Dispute Resolution Portal ("ODR Portal" – <https://smartodr.in/login>) which harnesses online conciliation and online arbitration for resolution of disputes arising in the Indian Securities Market. An investor/client shall first take up his/her/their grievance by lodging a complaint directly with the Company. If the grievance is not redressed satisfactorily, the investor/client may, in accordance with the SCORES guidelines, escalate the same through the SCORES Portal in accordance with the process laid out therein. After exhausting all available options for resolution of the grievance, if the investor/client is still not satisfied with the outcome, he/she/they can initiate dispute resolution through the ODR Portal. In compliance with the SEBI guidelines, the Company had sent communication intimating about the said Dispute Resolution Mechanism to all the members.
10. Members are requested to note that the Company's shares are under compulsory demat trading for all the investors. Therefore, the members holding equity shares of the Company in physical form are advised to dematerialize their shareholdings. The Company has connectivity from NSDL and CDSL and equity shares of the Company may be held in the electronic form with any Depository Participant (DP) with whom the members/investors are having their demat account. The ISIN No. for the Equity Shares of the Company is INE800A01015. In case of any query/difficulty in any matter relating thereto may be addressed to the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agents.
11. SEBI has mandated the submission of, inter alia, Permanent Account Number (PAN) by every participant in securities market. Members holding shares in dematerialised form are, therefore, requested to submit the PAN to their Depository Participants with whom they are maintaining their demat accounts. Members holding shares in physical form should submit their PAN and bank account details by way of filing Form ISR-1/ISR-2 to the Company or its Registrar and Share Transfer Agents- MUFG Intime India Private Limited.
12. As per the provisions of Section 72 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 19(1) of the Companies (Share Capital and Debentures) Rules, 2014 and SEBI Master Circular dated May 7, 2024, the facility for making nomination is available for the Members in respect of shares held by them. Members who have not yet registered their nomination are requested to register the same by submitting Form No. SH-13. If a member desires to opt out or cancel the earlier nomination and record a fresh nomination, he/she may submit the same in Form ISR-3 or SH-14 as the case may be. The said form can be downloaded from the Company's website or from the website of Registrar and Share Transfer Agents (RTA) of the Company. Members are requested to submit the said details to their Depository Participant in case the shares are held by them in dematerialized form and to the Registrar and Share Transfer Agents of the Company – MUFG Intime India Private Limited in case the shares are held in physical form.
13. Members who have so far not claimed or encashed the dividend warrant(s) for the financial year ended March 31, 2018 or any subsequent financial years, are requested to write to the Company or its Registrar and Share Transfer Agents, viz. MUFG Intime India Private Limited for claiming dividends declared by the Company. Details of unpaid/unclaimed dividend amounts lying with the Company are available on the website of the Company. During the year 2024-25, the Company was not required to transfer any amount of dividend remaining unpaid/unclaimed to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF) administered by the Central Government.

The members whose unclaimed dividend and/or shares, if already transferred to IEPF Account/IEPF Authority may claim the dividend and/or shares, as the case may be, from the IEPF Authority by following the Refund Procedure as detailed on the website of IEPF Authority - <http://www.iepf.gov.in/IEPF/refund.html>.

14. This Notice of the AGM along with the Attendance Slip, Proxy Form, Route map of the venue of the Meeting and the Annual Report 2024-25 of the Company are being sent by e-mail to all the members whose e-mail addresses (IDs) are registered with the Company/Depository Participant(s) unless any member has requested for a hard /physical copy of the same. For members who have not registered their e-mail addresses, physical copies of the aforesaid documents are being sent by the permitted mode. Members, who wish to update or register their e-mail addresses, in case of Demat holding, may please contact the Depository Participant (DP) and register their e-mail address, as per the process advised by the DP; and in case of Physical holding, may send a request in requisite Form ISR-1 along with necessary documents to the Registrar and Share Transfer Agents of the Company - MUFG Intime India Private Limited.

The Notice calling the AGM has been uploaded on the website of the Company at <https://www.birlacable.com>. The Notice can also be accessed from the websites of the Stock Exchanges i.e. BSE Limited and National Stock Exchange of India Limited at <https://www.bseindia.com> and <https://www.nseindia.com> respectively.

15. Members desirous of obtaining any information on Annual Financial Statements of the Company at the AGM are requested to write to the Company atleast one week (7 days) before the date of the AGM, so that the information required may be made available at the AGM.

16. Information pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 and the Secretarial Standard on General Meetings (SS-2) in respect of the Director seeking re-appointment at the ensuing AGM is furnished in Annexure 'A' which forms an integral part of the Notice. The Director has furnished the requisite consent/declaration for his re-appointment.
17. MUFG Intime India Private Limited, C-101, Embassy 247, L.B.S. Marg, Vikhroli (West), Mumbai – 400 083 continues to act in the capacity of Registrar and Share Transfer Agents of the Company. MUFG Intime India Private Limited is also the depository interface of the Company with both NSDL and CDSL. Members are requested to address all correspondences, including dividend matters, to the said Registrar and Share Transfer Agents.

Members are also informed that 'SWAYAM' a secure, user-friendly web-based application has been developed by "MUFG Intime India Private Limited", the Company's Registrar and Share Transfer Agents, that empowers shareholders to effortlessly access various services. 18. CDSL e-Voting System – For Remote e-Voting

- (i) In compliance with the provisions of Section 108 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 20 of the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 (as amended) and Regulation 44 of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (as amended), the Company is providing facility of Remote e-Voting ("Remote e-Voting is the facility of casting the votes by the Members using an electronic voting system for a place other than venue of the AGM on resolutions proposed to be considered at the AGM and as such all businesses may be transacted through Remote e-Voting") to its Members in respect of the business to be transacted at the AGM.
- (ii) The Company has engaged the services of Central Depository Services (India) Limited (CDSL) for facilitating voting through electronic means, as the authorized Remote e-Voting's agency. The Members who have cast their votes by Remote e-Voting prior to the AGM may also attend the AGM but shall not be entitled to cast their votes again. The AGM Notice is also disseminated on the website of CDSL i.e. <https://www.evotingindia.com>.
- (iii) The Remote e-Voting period shall commence on Tuesday, September 9, 2025 at 9.00 A.M. and end on Thursday, September 11, 2025 at 5.00 P.M. During this period, Members of the Company, holding shares either in physical form or in dematerialized form, as on the cut-off date (record date) i.e. September 5, 2025, may cast their votes electronically. The Remote e-Voting facility shall be disabled by CDSL for voting thereafter and will not be allowed beyond the said date and time. Once the vote on a resolution is cast by the member, the member shall not be allowed to change it subsequently. A person who is not a member as on the cut-off date should treat this Notice of AGM for information purposes only. The voting rights of the members shall be reckoned in proportion to their shareholding in the total paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date i.e. September 5, 2025.
- (iv) Any person who acquires shares of the Company and becomes member of the Company after dispatch of the Notice and holding shares at the cut-off date i.e. September 5, 2025, may obtain login id and password by sending a request at helpdesk.evoting@cdslindia.com. However, if a person is already registered with CDSL for Remote e-Voting, then they can use their existing User ID and Password to cast the vote.
- (v) In order to increase the efficiency of the voting process, e-Voting facility is provided to all the demat account holders, by way of a single login credential, through their demat accounts/websites of Depositories/Depository Participants. Demat account holders would be able to cast their vote without having to register again with the e-Voting service providers (ESP), thereby, not only facilitating seamless authentication but also enhancing ease and convenience of participating in e-Voting process.

Prior, thereto, the Hon'ble Division Bench by an ad-inetrim order dated October 1,2020 passed in the said appeal, clarified the order dated September 18, 2020.

All these purported actions/decisions taken by the two of the Joint APLs illegally and without following the due process of law have been nullified by the judgment and order dated December 14, 2023.

The defendants in the probate suit being T.S. No. 6 of 2004 have preferred Special Leave Petitions from the aforesaid judgment and order dated December 14, 2023. The Hon'ble Supreme Court has, by an order dated March 22, 2024 declined to pass any interim order in such petitions.

Your Directors have the pleasure in presenting the Thirty Third (33rd) Annual Report together with the Audited Financial Statements of your Company for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2025.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Ind AS in terms of the provisions of Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended from time to time.

STATE OF COMPANY'S AFFAIRS

The Company is predominantly engaged in the business of manufacturing and sales of all types of Optical Fibre Cables, Copper Telecommunication Cables, Structured Copper LAN Cables, Specialty cables and allied accessories. There has been no material change in the nature of business of the Company during the financial year ended March 31, 2025.

GENERAL & CORPORATE MATTERS

During the year under review, your Company achieved standalone Revenue from operations of ₹ 66165.23 lakhs as compared to ₹ 68549.80 lakhs in the previous year (decrease of about 3.48%). The significant reduction in the order flow is mainly due to drastic fall in demand for optical fibre cables from both domestic and export market segments as all the telecom operators adopted a strategy of monetizing the already built-up capex and put a hold on further expansion of the network. The standalone Profit before Depreciation and Tax for the year stood at ₹ 2259.33 lakhs as compared to ₹ 4092.47 lakhs in the previous year. It is purely attributed to a deep fall in the global level telecom network expansion. However, the Company has clocked a historically highest sales in the Structured Copper LAN Cable segment, thereby ensuring the Company operations to a reasonable levels ultimately maneuvering out of the tough market situation.

The recent market intelligence report suggests that the global optical fibre cable demand in 2025 Q1 is set to increase by 2.0% on a year-on-year basis, reaching 126.3 million FKM. Simultaneously, the global optical fibre cable production is projected to grow by 2.7% on a year-on-year basis exceeding 123.1 million FKM in 2025 Q1. A very decent growth is expected across nearly all regions except for China. The world's largest market, China, is projected to experience a contraction of over 3.2% on a year-on-year basis in optical fibre cable demand in 2025 Q1, declining to 52.3 million FKM from 54.0 million FKM in 2024 Q1. This decline can be attributed to the sluggish carrier demand, delays in tender evaluation and shrinking demand. In APAC region excluding China region, optical fibre cable demand is estimated to reach 14.0 million FKM, by growing close to 5.6% on a year-on-year basis in 2025 Q1. The growth is driven by ongoing telecom infrastructure projects, rising data center investments, and government driven national broadband initiatives in markets like Australia, India and ASEAN nations. India, being the largest consumer in the said region, is expected to experience a decent growth on a year-on-year basis in cable demand, due to gradually increasing procurement from private telecom carriers and government tenders.

Europe's optical fibre cable demand is anticipated to grow very modestly by 1.5% on a year-on-year basis, reaching 16.4 million FKM in 2025 Q1. Meanwhile, optical fibre cable production in the region is expected to increase by over 5.5% on a year-on-year basis, nearing 17.5 million FKM. The rebound follows six consecutive quarters of declining demand and is driven by increased fibre deployment activities across key markets since the start of the year 2025. In Western Europe, countries like Germany and UK are expected to see expansions in FTTH roll-outs, while Italy is likely to witness a modest growth supported by the ongoing government driven projects. In Eastern Europe, the markets like Poland and Romania are expected to see marginal increase in demand for optical fibre cable owing to the nationwide network expansions. However, Russia is forecasted to continue experiencing declining

cable demand due to reduced investments and economic challenges. In North America, optical fibre cable demand is projected to grow by over 9.1% on a year-on-year basis, reaching 28.2 million FKM in 2025 Q1. The USA, a key contributor to the regional demand for optical fibre cables, is expected to see close to 10.0% growth on a year-on-year basis in optical fibre cable consumption. The anticipated increase is primarily driven by the expansion of hyperscale data centres and telecom network build-outs by major telecom players in USA. Despite facing challenges, including subscriber losses linked to the end of the Affordable Connectivity Program, carriers and ISPs continue to gradually expand the optical fibre cable infrastructure in the country.

Overall, due to the glut in the optical fibre cable network roll-out requirements in both India and the overseas market witnessed throughout the last year of 2024, the entire cable manufacturing industry could not ramp up its offerings in a big way as compared to the peak times, two years back. By the end of 2025 or during the beginning of 2026, the market is expected to stabilise and then gradual growth curve is expected to be seen. The optical fibre industry is facing another major challenge right now in terms excess capacities already built up primarily in China, followed by India and other major economies coupled with drastic fall in the demand for network build-outs. In summary, the fibre optic industry is expected to pick up to the growth path only in 2026, which should propel the industry to new heights in terms of full capacity utilization.

Due to the cyclical nature of the business prospects in optical fibre cables, the Company's strategy of having diversified product portfolio like, metal based Cables like Structured Copper LAN Cables for Broadband connectivity applications, has paid off well and enabled the Company to hold its head above the waters by way of giving historically highest ever turnover for the financial year 2024-25. With highest customer appreciation, the Company is continue to serve its esteemed customers with innovative product offerings coupled with the right pricing strategy.

The members are advised to refer to the separate section on Management Discussion and Analysis for a detailed understanding of the operating results and business performance.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The management discussion and analysis of financial condition and results of operations of the Company for the year under review, as stipulated under the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements), 2015, as amended from time to time ("Listing Regulations"), is provided in the Management Discussion and Analysis Report, which forms a part of the Annual Report.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

During the year under review, the Company continued its focus on judicious capital allocation and incurred capital expenditure aggregating to ₹ 2843.60 lakhs, consisting of addition to (a) Plant & Equipment of ₹ 2769.10 lakhs; and (b) Other Fixed Assets of ₹ 74.50 lakhs for further capacity expansion/augmentation.

DIVIDEND

After considering the Company's profitability, free cash flow and overall financial performance, the Board of Directors has decided not to recommend any Dividend on Equity Shares for the Financial Year 2024-25 in order to conserve cash resources for future business requirements.

TRANSFER TO RESERVES

During the year under review, the Company has not transferred any amounts to the General Reserve. For complete details on movement in Reserves and Surplus during the financial year ended March 31, 2025, please refer to the 'Statement of Changes in Equity' included in the standalone and consolidated financial statements of the Annual report.

UNPAID DIVIDEND

The disclosure relating to year wise amount of unpaid/unclaimed dividend lying in the Unpaid Dividend account and the corresponding equity shares which are liable to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF) and the due date of such transfer is provided in the Corporate Governance Report which forms part of the Annual Report.

SHARE CAPITAL

The paid-up Equity Share Capital of the Company as at March 31, 2025 stood at ₹ 3000.00 lakhs. During the year under review, the Company has neither issued shares with differential rights as to dividend, voting or otherwise nor has granted stock options or sweat equity under any scheme. Further, none of the Directors of the Company holds investments convertible into equity shares of the Company as on March 31, 2025.

DEPOSITS/FINANCE

During the year under review, your Company has not accepted any public deposits within the meaning of Section(s) 73 to 76 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014 and as such no amount on account of principal or interest on public deposits was outstanding as on the date of the Balance Sheet.

Your Company continued to optimise bank borrowings by focusing on cash flows and working capital management. The Company's financial discipline and prudence is reflected in the credit rating ascribed by the external rating agency.

The Company Secretary is responsible for compliance of corporate laws including the Companies Act, 2013, SEBI Act 1992, Listing Regulations and relevant rules/guidelines as well as other corporate laws/rules and regulations including any statutory amendment(s), modification(s) or enactment(s) thereto to the extent apply and extend to the Company.

During the year, the audits for these Certifications established continuous improvement in performance against these standards.

Your directors are pleased to report that as an unwavering commitment to quality assurance, the Testing Laboratory of Company's OFC Unit has obtained a Certificate of Accreditation during the year under review in accordance with the standard ISO/IEC17025:2017 from National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL) for its facilities at Rewa (M.P.) in the field of testing of optical fibre, optical fibre cables and the said accreditation is valid upto January 8, 2026. Our OFC Testing Laboratory, Rewa also has been assessed and designated as Conformity Assessment Body (CAB) from Government of India, Ministry of Communications, Department of Telecommunications, Telecommunication Engineering Centre, New Delhi.

DIRECTORS

Shri Ravindra Pratap Singh (DIN: 00240910), who was appointed as an Additional Director with effect from August 9, 2024, has been appointed as a Non-Executive Non-Independent Director of the Company, liable to retire by rotation, by the members of the Company by way of an Ordinary Resolution passed on October 17, 2024, through Postal Ballot including Remote e-voting.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 152 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with rules framed thereunder and the Company's Articles of Association, Shri Harsh Vardhan Lodha (DIN: 00394094), Director is liable to retire by rotation at the ensuing Annual General Meeting and being eligible has offered himself for re-appointment as a Director of the Company. The Nomination and Remuneration Committee as well as Board of Directors of the Company has recommended his re-appointment for the consideration of the members of the Company at the ensuing Annual General Meeting. As required under the Regulation 36(3) of the Listing Regulations and relevant provisions of the Secretarial Standard on the General Meeting (SS-2), the brief resume and other details of Shri Harsh Vardhan Lodha is given in Annexure 'A' to the Notice of the ensuing Annual General Meeting.

During the year under review, Shri Nitin Arora resigned from the post of Company Secretary of the Company with effect from the close of business hours on January 18, 2025 and Ms. Suman was appointed as the Company Secretary of the Company with effect from March 21, 2025.

As required under the Companies Act, 2013 and Listing Regulations, the Company has also constituted various other statutory committees of the Board viz. Nomination and Remuneration Committee, Stakeholders Relationship Committee and Corporate Social Responsibility Committee.

The requisite details of all the committees including their terms of reference, composition, number of meetings held during the year under review and attendance at the meetings, etc. are provided in the Report on Corporate Governance forming a part of the Annual Report.

In terms of the provisions of Section 139 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014 as amended vide the Companies (Amendment) Act, 2017 and the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Amendment Rules, 2018 respectively, Messrs V. Sankar Aiyar & Co., Chartered Accountants (Firm Registration No.109208W) were appointed as Statutory Auditors of the Company to hold office for a term of five (5) years until the conclusion of the 35th Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Company to be held for the financial year 2026-27. The Auditors have confirmed to the Company that they continue to remain eligible to hold office as the Auditors and are not disqualified for being so appointed as Statutory Auditors under the Companies Act, 2013, the Chartered Accountants Act, 1949 and the rules and regulations framed thereunder.

The Board of Directors, on the recommendation of the Audit Committee, has re-appointed Messrs D. The other identified key initiatives for conservation of energy during the financial year 2024-25 were-

(i) The material steps taken or impact on conservation of energy:

- Replaced TL-1 Takeup DC Motors & Drives by new one having energy efficient AC motors with VFD drives to optimize power consumption.
- Replaced TL-3 Takeup DC Motors & Drives by new ones having energy efficient AC motors with VFD drives to optimize power consumption.
- PPCH Pipeline implemented in new project to reduce air friction and thereby resulting in high efficiency of compressed air system.
- Replaced old AC with new energy efficient Inverter AC.
- Highly efficient ring blade knife air wipers used in the Sheathing Lines.
- Maintained Power Factor more than 0.995 to get maximum incentive, throughout the year by continuous monitoring and upkeep of the APFC Panels.

(ii) The steps taken by Company for adoption of Renewable Energy

- Company has entered into a Power Purchase Agreement with a Wind-Solar Hybrid power plant for dedicated 1.5 MW power supply under Long Term Open Access (LTOA)/Medium Term Open Access (MTOA) under Intra State Group Active Scheme. This strategic decision underscores the company's proactive approach towards expanding renewable energy adoption.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS

The Company's main business activities are manufacturing and sales of all types of Optical Fibre Cables, Copper Telecommunication Cables, Structured Copper LAN Cables, Specialty cables and allied accessories.

Despite a lull in the requirement of Optical Fibre Cables during the start of the Financial Year 2024 – 25 under review, the Structured Copper LAN Cables segment clocked great volumes and the year started off with resilience in the operations and this pattern continued throughout the year, thereby uplifting the overall performance of the company and finally helped the Company to maneuver the tough times in the telecom sector.

The deep glut in the demand of Optical Fibre Cables on a global level affected the entire industry to historically very low levels thereby affecting the cable manufacturing industry to a great extent. It is purely due to the exceptional performance from the other industry segment of Structured Copper LAN Cable manufacturing, the Company could survive this big downturn in the demand of Optical Fibre Cables. However, the overall telecom industry is poised to revive in 2025 end, and thereby giving a boost to the demand of building new Optical Fibre Cable Networks. Overall, the Company is having resilient systems in place to withstand the cyclical downturn in the industry.

In general, there is no material change in the industry structure.

OVERALL REVIEW

Business Review and Outlook

India has witnessed one of the fastest 5G roll-outs globally. Since its launch in October 2022, 5G has been deployed across all states and union territories and is currently available in 773 out of 776 districts. The 5G infrastructure has also expanded rapidly, with the country now hosting over 0.46 million 5G transceiver stations. Moreover as of end of March 2025, India's 5G subscriber base has grown significantly to over 250 million. The industry continues to accelerate 5G deployment, while the government is making efforts to take an early lead in adopting the next generation networks – 6G. Together, these advanced communication technologies are paving the way for the development of a multitude of innovative use cases beyond traditional voice calls and data services, and are expected to drive India's digital economy.

The adoption of 5G in India is being driven by the increased availability of affordable 5G-enabled smartphones, low tariffs, the adoption of next-generation technologies and a rapidly evolving digital ecosystem. All the major operators have been offering 5G services at no extra cost and have only recently revised their tariff structure upwards. The availability of budget friendly 5G smartphones has further fuelled the adoption, with handset manufacturers offering devices with advanced capabilities at increasingly affordable price points. Another key driver is the growing adoption of next generation technologies such as cloud computing, artificial intelligence and internet of things (IoT), all of which require high speed, low latency networks. For instance, 5G powered IoT sensors are being used to detect equipment anomalies, facilitating predictive maintenance and reducing down-time. Furthermore, 5G is playing an integral role in the development of smart cities, with applications in traffic management, energy distribution and public safety. The adoption of cloud based applications in sectors such as healthcare, education and retail is also driving enterprises and institutions to embrace 5G connectivity for more efficient and scalable operations.

Moreover, the introduction of fixed wireless access (FWA) using 5G is seen as a visible solution for broadband penetration in underserved regions, offering a complementing solution to the subscribers. This augurs well, as the growing need for reliable, high-capacity connectivity to support hybrid work models, streaming content and smart home solutions is accelerating the 5G uptake.

As India continues to expand its 5G network, the government is laying the ground work to take an early lead in 6G technology. Expected to launch in the early 2030s, 6G will build upon the foundation established by 5G, enabling transformative applications that merge the digital and physical worlds. Research in 6G use cases is already underway with potential applications such as immersive tele-presence through the internet of senses, enhanced human-machine interaction, widespread mixed reality in public transport, precision healthcare, smart agriculture and autonomous supply chains. India is also positioning itself at the forefront of 6G innovation. The country has secured over 200 patents, is actively involved in international standard-setting forums such as the International Telecommunication Union, and has formed specialised innovation groups and task forces. The government has also released a "6G Vision Document", detailed its strategic road map for the leadership in 6G development. Both 5G and 6G technologies mark a departure from the legacy networks, moving beyond traditional voice and data services to low-latency, high bandwidth applications. Both these technologies require large scale deployment of Optical Fibre Cables across the entire Telecommunication Network which should give a fillip to the Cable Manufacturing industry in the years to come. According to the recent industry report, India is expected to have 770 million 5G subscribers by 2028. Further 5G data usage is projected to surpass 4G by the Q1 of 2026. The coming years will see Indian telecom sector shaped by rapid 5G uptake, groundwork for 6G, and a greater focus on digital inclusion. As 5G matures and continues to evolve, its role in enabling smart cities, Industry 4.0, IoT and immersive mobile experiences will become more pronounced. The eventual commercialisation of 5G Advanced systems will further accelerate these transformations and help unlock the full potential of next-generation connectivity.

Further, the broadband is extensively delivered by using copper LAN Cables on taking the strengths of Optical Fibre Cables in the backbone network. Lot of Enterprise Networks deeply use the Structured Copper LAN Cables in huge volumes, as the hybrid model of the Network topology delivers the desired broadband connections to the end subscribers in a dense application environment. Overall the hybrid application use cases, help the cable manufacturing sector to derive major advantages in terms of bulk uptake and thereby delivers growth trajectory in a calibrated way.

The ambitious BharatNet Project's Phase III of Government of India as part of its 'Digital India' Program at last has started to take-off, as the orders are already getting placed on the successful bidders. This three year project is definitely poised to ramp up the consumption of Optical Fibre Cables as the Network has to be deployed in the Middle Mile levels to ultimately give broadband penetration in the gram panchayat nodes on a pan-India basis and to give final connectivity to the intended applications. Overall the Cable manufacturing industry is expected to benefit from the huge planned requirement of Optical Fibre Cables.

Some of the key triggers for data explosion in India are low data tariff plans, access to affordable smartphones, the government's focus on 'Digital India' program to deliver citizen centric services across the country in a big way, the growing user base of social media, gaming, e-commerce, digital transactions and over the-top platforms. Further, the overall public cloud services market in India is expected to reach around US \$ 24 billion by 2028, as per some industry reports. Moreover, driven by the artificial intelligence (AI) requirements, the global data centre (DC) market has already witnessed multiple large scale deals (over 300 MW) signed by hyper-scale Data Centre players and India is definitely expected to follow the trend. This large scale Data Centre projects have already started giving tremendous impetus to the cable manufacturing sector as high density, large fibre count Optical Fibre Cables coupled with high performance structured LAN Cable offerings finding robust use cases in this fast developing Data Centre market.

Telecommunication Cables

(A) Optical Fibre Cables (OFC)

The OFC business decreased to a level of ₹ 11516.07 lakhs during the financial year 2024-25 as compared to ₹ 23893.14 lakhs in the previous year due to very low demand of optical fibre cables in both domestic and export segments. Out of this, exports contributed to a level of ₹ 7402.38 lakhs during the financial year 2024-25 due to sluggish market conditions.

(B) Copper Telecommunication/Structured Cables

The Company has ramped up the sales of Structured Copper LAN Cables and has clocked a robust increase in the turnover in this Copper cable segment during the financial year 2024-25, thereby achieving the historically highest turnover for the Company in this segment. The sales of this type of cable increased to ₹ 51520.66 lakhs during the financial year under review as compared to ₹ 42218.57 lakhs in the previous year. The Company's robust customer service and meeting prompt delivery requirements have been well appreciated with the leading customers in this business segment and the Company is well poised to serve the long term customers to fulfil their needs by setting up one of the industry's best benchmark standards in all their requirements.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

- (a) The revenue from operations decreased by 3.47% to ₹ 66165.23 lakhs during the financial year 2024-25 as compared to ₹ 68549.80 lakhs during the previous year, primarily due to slow down in the optical fibre cable business.
- (b) The raw material consumption was higher by 0.57 % as compared to previous year.
- (c) During the year under review, the Finance cost has decreased to ₹ 1334.85 lakhs in current year under review as compared to ₹ 1486.52 lakhs in the previous year.
- (d) The profit after tax for the year under review stood at ₹ 503.11 lakhs as compared to ₹ 2248.75 lakhs in the year 2023-24.
- (e) The Other Equity of the Company stood at ₹ 22428.17 lakhs for the year under review.
- (f) The additions to the Fixed Assets of ₹ 2843.60 lakhs during the year is mainly on expansion of existing manufacturing capacity of the Company.

OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS

The Indian telecom market has expanded rapidly in the past few years, driven by the increasing availability of affordable smartphones, low tariffs, government initiatives, digital applications and advancements in next-generation technologies. The number of telephone connections grew from 933 million in March 2014 to 1,188.7 million in October 2024, with overall tele-density reaching approximately 84.5 per cent. Internet connections also rose sharply from 251.5 million in March 2014 to 969.6 million in June 2024, reflecting a 285.53 per cent growth. Meanwhile, average monthly data consumption per wireless subscriber increased by 353 times, reaching 21.30 GB in June 2024, compared to just 61.66 MB in March 2014. To support this surge in telecom services, both the government and industry have taken several steps to enhance network capacity and coverage and improve the quality of services. There has been a significant growth in the deployment of telecom towers, optical fibre cables (OFCs), base transceiver stations (BTSs) and small cells across the country. The country now has approximately 0.8 million telecom towers, 2.93 million BTSs and over 0.46 million 5G mobile BTSs. Fibre infrastructure has also advanced considerably, with over 3.72 million route Km of OFC deployed. The pace of fibre deployment has accelerated significantly since the launch of 5G services, averaging around 0.1 million route Km per month compared to about 0.017 million in the pre-5G years.

With telecom emerging as the backbone of India's digital economy, industry stakeholders, including technology companies and investors, can leverage the opportunities arising from rapid expansion and modernisation. Telecom operators, driven by the roll-out of 5G services and India's ambition to take an early lead in 6G, can enhance their service offerings and tap into new revenue streams. They can achieve this by deploying small cells, expanding OFC networks to meet 5G's high speed, low latency requirements and forming partnerships with infrastructure providers and technology companies to reduce capital expenditure. Meanwhile, tower companies stand to benefit from the increased network densification, as small cells and fibre deployment become integral to next generation networks. Currently, the fiberisation of cell towers stands at 44 % only and to have a sufficient speed in line with the 4G and 5G communication requirements, the country should reach the level of 85 – 90 % fiberisation of the cell towers. All the telecom operators and the tower companies are concentrating on this aspect, which surely will provide great supply opportunities to the Optical Fibre Cable manufacturing sector.

However, despite these advancements and tremendous opportunities, telecom infrastructure remains grossly insufficient to meet the growing demand for seamless connectivity. Challenges such as securing the Right of Way (RoW) permissions, particularly in urban areas, continue to delay the deployment of telecom towers and OFCs, despite efforts to standardise charges and streamline approvals. The high capital expenditure required for infrastructure expansion also remains a major hurdle, along with spectrum acquisition and 5G roll-out costs. Moreover, there remains a significant rural-urban divide in telecom services, with rural tele-density at around 58.5 per cent, significantly lagging behind urban tele-density, which stands at around 132 per cent.

On a brighter note, the Government of India has given tremendous policy impetus to accelerate the growth, but it requires further room for improvement. The government has launched several initiatives to accelerate digital infrastructure deployment across the country. One such key move was the launch of the GatiShakti Sanchar Portal in 2022, aimed at centralising and streamlining RoW approvals. By integrating stakeholders across central and state governments, local bodies and service providers, the portal has reduced bureaucratic delays and minimised paperwork. Moreover, in September 2024, the Department of Telecommunications released the new RoW rules to further facilitate the installation of telecom infrastructure.

The Government's policy decisions always shape up the telecom industry in general and any new changes in the rules and guidelines will have a bearing in the industry. However, with the robust system in place, the industry is able to forge ahead with the drive to sustain the growth trajectory.

RISKS AND CONCERNS

As in the case of any other industry segments, risks are always there and the telecom industry is also prone to various roadblocks from time to time, in terms of non-availability of cheaper finances, logistics issues, policy concerns, taxation perils, availability of skilled workforce, foreign exchange fluctuations and high turn-over of workforce. The concern about logistics related to bringing in the raw materials into the manufacturing locations and reaching out to the customers with the finished products still remain as a major bottleneck due to geopolitical disturbances in recent times coupled with increased cost of logistics. However, your Company has systems and robust policies in place which should fend-off these risks and concerns.

Technological

- (a) No more traditional copper telecommunication cable requirements in the network are required, as all the telecom operators are going for optical fibre cables.
- (b) Cut-throat competition is the norm which is always prevailing in the cable industry as some of the players offering highly advantageous price levels to the customers, thereby bringing the margins under huge pressure.
- (c) Players offering products with inferior technology, ultimately affecting the network to standards which are not at par with international ones.

Financial

Financial risks would include, inter alia, low-capacity utilization, un-remunerative prices, highly concentrated customers base, shorter delivery schedule and liquidated damages, foreign exchange exposure and related exchange rates fluctuation, commodity price including adverse movements in prices of raw-materials, warranty, and security, current or future litigations, working capital management and interest rate, contingent liabilities, etc. In addition, the credit risks could increase, if the financial condition of Company's customers declines. The Company regularly identifies and monitors the financial risks as well as potential business threats and develops appropriate risk mitigation plans. The Company's crisis management capability is also reasonably honed to protect its reputation with its stakeholders.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS

The Company's system of financial, operational and compliance control and risk management is embedded in the business process by which the Company pursues its objectives. The established system also provides a reasonable assurance on the efficiencies of operations, safety of assets besides orderly and legitimate conduct of Company's business in the circumstances which may reasonably be foreseen. The Company has a defined organization structure; authority levels, delegated powers, internal procedures, rules and guidelines for conducting business transactions.

The Company has already engaged a firm of Chartered Accountants for internal auditing, who besides conducting periodic audits, independently reviews and strengthens the control measures. The Internal Auditors regularly brief the Management and the Audit Committee on their findings and also on the steps to be taken with regard to deviations, if any.

ENVIRONMENT & SAFETY

The Company successfully continued with the implementation of occupational health and safety, quality and environmental protection measures and these are ongoing processes at the Company's plant and facilities. Various proactive measures have also been adopted and implemented which, inter alia, include adoption of cleaner technologies wherever feasible, conservation of resources through waste reduction and training of employees with a focus on sustainable development by improving standards on occupational health & safety and environment protection. As a recognition of these objectives, the entire range of products of the Company continue to remain certified to the requirement of international standard ISO 14001:2015 (Environmental Management System) and ISO 45001:2018 (Occupational Health and Safety Management System) by the DNV Business Assurance India Pvt Ltd.

INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS & HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AND CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Company sees its relationship with its employees as critical to the future and believes that every employee needs to possess apart from competence, capacity and capabilities, sustainable values, current and contemporary which would make them useful, relevant and competitive in managing the change constructively for overall growth of the organization. To this end, the Company's approach and efforts are directed towards creating a congenial work atmosphere for individual growth, creativity and greater dedicated participation in organizational development. In-house and external training and instructions are also provided to employees at all levels, which help in attaining professional and productive culture by a blend of technology and highly skilled manpower.

The Company is committed to maintain good industrial relations through active participation of workers, regular meetings and discussions on all legitimate and legally tenable issues. The Company employed 302 number of permanent employees on its Roll as on March 31, 2025.

1. CORPORATE GOVERNANCE PHILOSOPHY:

The Company operates within accepted standards of propriety and justice with transparency in all dealings, without compromising on integrity, corporate social responsibility and regulatory compliances concerning business and operations of the Company.

The importance of Corporate Governance lies in its contribution both to business prosperity and to accountability. Corporate Governance envisages commitment of the Company towards the attainment of high levels of transparency, accountability and business prosperity with the ultimate objective of realising long term shareholder value, whilst taking into account the interest of all other stakeholders for wealth creation. The Company will continue its efforts towards raising its standard in Corporate Governance and will also review its systems and procedures constantly in order to keep pace with the changing governance and economic environment.

The Company has complied with the applicable requirements of Corporate Governance and the Disclosures as contained in this Report are in accordance with Regulation 34(3) read with Para C of Schedule V of the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 as amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the “Listing Regulations”).

2. BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

The Board of Directors of the Company has an optimum combination of Executive and Non-Executive Directors which comprises of Six (6) Directors including One Independent Woman Director as on March 31, 2025. The Company has a regular Non-Executive Chairman who is not related to the Manager & CEO of the Company as per definition of the term “relative” defined under the Companies Act, 2013. The number of Independent Directors on the Board is Three (3), which is half of the total number of Directors and all the Directors of the Company are Non-Executive Directors. The composition of Board of Directors of the Company is materially in compliance with the provisions of Regulation 17 of the Listing Regulations. The composition of the Board of Directors is also in conformity with the provisions of Section 149 of the Companies Act, 2013.

None of the Directors on the Board is a member in more than Ten (10) Board level committees or acts as chairman of more than Five (5) Board level committees across all the public limited companies (listed or unlisted) in which he/she is a Director. The necessary disclosures regarding Committee memberships/ chairmanships have been made by the Directors. None of the Independent Directors serves as such on the Board of more than Seven (7) listed companies. Further, the Independent Directors do not serve as Whole-Time Director/Managing Director on the Board of any listed company. None of the Independent Directors has any material pecuniary relationship or transactions with the Company other than (i) the sitting fees payable and reimbursement of incidental expenses incurred by them for attending the Meeting(s) of Board of Directors and Committee thereof; and (ii) remuneration/compensation by way of profit related commission or otherwise as permissible for each financial year commencing on or after April 1, 2019 of such sum or sums in such proportion/manner and upto such extent as the Board of Directors shall determine from time to time within the overall maximum limit of 1% (One percent) per annum of Net Profits of the Company for the relevant financial year computed in the manner as laid down in Section 198 and other governing provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and rules framed thereunder. The Non-Executive Independent Directors fulfil the conditions of independence specified in Section 149(6) of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 16(1)(b) of the Listing Regulations and individually have submitted a declaration that they meet the criteria of independence and that they are not aware of any circumstance or situation, which exist or may be reasonably anticipated, that could impair or impact their ability to discharge their duties with an objective independent judgment and without any external influence. In the opinion of Board of Directors, the Independent Directors fulfill the conditions specified in the Companies Act, 2013, Listing Regulations and are independent of the management. No Independent Director of the Company has resigned before the expiry of his/her tenure.

Ltd. have filed Form DIR-12 with the Ministry of Corporate Affairs on the basis of an illegal direction from one of the Administrators Pendent Lite (APL) of the Estate of Priyamvada Devi Birla purportedly acting on the basis of wrongful interpretation of the judgement and order dated September 18, 2020 of the Learned Single Judge of the High Court at Calcutta that he has ceased to be a director in the said companies. The wrongful act has been done without his knowledge, consent and without any compliance with the provisions of law which has been legally challenged by him. As per disclosure made by him, there has been no cessation of his directorship in any of these Companies. The judgment and order dated September 18, 2020 was challenged by him in appeal being A.P.O Nos. 92 of 2020 which has been disposed of by the Hon'ble Division Bench by a judgement and order dated December 14, 2023 modifying the judgement and order dated September 18, 2020 of the Learned Single Judge in the light of the observations made in the said judgement and order dated December 14, 2023. The application being G.A. No.2 of 2020 and G.A. No. 3 of 2020 filed by him in connection with the illegal and wrongful action of the two of the joint APLs were also disposed of accordingly. Prior, thereto, the Hon'ble Division Bench by an ad-interim order dated October 1, 2020 passed in the said appeal, clarified the order dated September 18, 2020.

All these purported actions/decisions taken by the two of the joint APLs illegally and without following the due process of law have been nullified by the judgment and order dated December 14, 2023.

The defendants in the probate suit being T.S. No. 6 of 2004 have preferred Special Leave Petitions from the aforesaid judgement and order dated December 14, 2023. The Hon'ble Supreme Court has, by an order dated March 22, 2024 declined to pass any interim order in such petitions.

4.1 Remuneration Policy

iii. Commodity Risks faced by the Company during the Financial Year 2024-25 and how they have been managed

The Company is affected by the price volatility of aforesaid commodities. Its operating activities require the purchase of raw material for manufacturing of Cables and therefore, requires a continuous supply of certain raw materials such as optical fibre, plastic and polymer copper etc. To mitigate the commodity price risk, the Company has an approved supplier base to get the best competitive prices for the commodities and also to manage the cost without any compromise on quality.

Foreign Exchange Risk:

The Company is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from foreign currency transactions of imports and exports primarily with respect to USD and Euro. The risk arising out of exchange rate fluctuations is managed as per "Forex Risk Management Policy". The uncovered exposure is critically examined on an on-going basis. After comparing prevailing currency rates with the benchmark rates, and evaluating currency trends & price forecast, hedging decisions are taken within policy guidelines and ensured that no exposure worth hedging remains unhedged.

2. 12. 1. NOTES TO STANDALONE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2025

1.1 Company Overview

Birla Cable Limited (B Cab) (“the Company”) is a public limited listed company incorporated under the Companies Act, 1956 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2013). The Company is engaged in manufacturing and sale of Cables (comprising of telecommunications cables, other types of wires & cables etc.). The registered office of the Company is located at Udyog Vihar, P.O. Chorhata, Rewa - 486 006 (M.P.), India and its CIN No. is L31300MP1992PLC007190.

The standalone financial statements were approved by the Board of Directors of the Company in their meeting held on 21st May, 2025.

1.2 Basis of Preparation and Presentation

The standalone financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with and to comply in all material aspects with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as notified under the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (“the Act”), Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended and other relevant provisions of the Act, as applicable.

The standalone financial statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis under historical cost convention, except for certain financial assets and financial liabilities which have been measured at fair value as required by relevant Ind AS.

Company’s standalone financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is also its functional currency. All amounts in the financial statements and accompanying notes are presented in lakhs (Indian Rupees) and have been rounded-off to two decimal place in accordance with the provisions of Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013, unless stated otherwise.

1.3 Basis of Classification of Current and Non-Current

Assets and Liabilities are classified as either current or non-current as per the Company’s normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of products and the time between acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation in cash & cash equivalents, 12 months period has been considered by the Company as its normal operating cycle.

1.4 Use of Estimates & Critical Judgements

The preparation of standalone financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in India requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the standalone financial statements and the results of operations during the reporting year end. Although these estimates and associated assumptions are based upon historical experiences and various other factors besides management’s best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results could differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on a periodic basis. Any revision in the accounting estimates is recognised in the period in which the results are known/ materialise.

Significant Judgements and key sources of estimation in applying accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Useful lives and residual values of property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment represent a material portion of the Company’s asset base. The periodic charge of depreciation is derived after estimating useful life of an asset and expected residual value at the end of its useful life. The useful lives and residual values of assets are estimated by the management at the time the asset is acquired and reviewed periodically, including at each financial year end. The lives are based on various external and internal factors including historical experience, relative efficiency and operating costs and change in technology.

(b) Defined benefit obligations

Defined benefit obligations are measured at fair value for financial reporting purposes. Fair value determined by actuary is based on actuarial assumptions. Management judgement is required to determine such actuarial assumptions. Such assumptions are reviewed annually using the best information available with the Management.

(c) Impairment of Financial Assets

The Company assesses at each date of balance sheet whether a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Ind AS 109 requires expected credit losses to be measured through a loss allowance. The Company determines expected credit losses after taking into account the past history of recovery, risk of default of the counterparty, existing market conditions, etc. The impairment methodology is applied on individual customer basis and depends on whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition.

1.5 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

PPE are stated at cost, net of recoverable taxes, discount, government grants/subsidies and rebates, etc. less accumulated depreciation and impairment loss, if any. Such cost includes purchase price, borrowing cost and any cost directly attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition for its intended use.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of any component accounted for as a separate asset is derecognized when replaced.

Spare parts in the nature of PPE are capitalised and depreciated over their remaining useful lives.

Gains or losses arising from de-recognition of PPE is measured as the difference between the net disposable proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the asset is de-recognised.

(b) Intangible Assets

License fees and associated implementation costs incurred for Computer Software are measured initially at cost only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost can be measured reliably. After initial recognition, an intangible asset is carried at its cost, less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

(c) Non-current assets (or disposal groups) classified as held for sale:

Non-current assets held for sale are presented separately in the Balance Sheet when the following criteria are met:

- The Company is committed to sale the asset;
- The assets are available for sale immediately;
- An active plan of sale has commenced; and
- Sale is expected to be completed within 12 months.

Assets held for sale and disposal groups are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less cost to sell. Assets held for sale are no longer amortised or depreciated.

(d) Depreciation/Amortisation

Depreciation on PPE is provided on straight line method at the rates determined based on the useful lives of respective assets as prescribed in the Schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 and/or useful life reviewed and assessed by the Company based on technical evaluation of relevant class of assets, as detailed below:

Leasehold Land	99 years
Buildings	30/60 years
Plant and Equipments	3 to 15 years
Furniture and Fixtures	10 years
Vehicles	8 to 10 years
Office Equipment & Computer	3 years

Depreciation on PPE added/disposed-off/discarded during the year is provided on pro-rata basis with respect to the month of addition/disposal/discarding.

Right-of-use Assets (Land) is amortised on a straight line basis over the period of Lease (99 Years).

Right-of-use Assets (Building) is amortised on a straight line basis over the period of lease term (5 Years).

Intangible Asset is measured at cost and amortised so as to reflect the pattern in which the assets economic benefits are consumed. The useful life of Computer Software has been estimated as five years.

Depreciation method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted, if considered appropriate.

(e) Impairment of Non-Financial Assets

Assessment is done at each balance sheet date as to whether there is any indication that an asset (PPE and Intangible) may be impaired. If any such indication exists, an estimate of the recoverable amount of the asset /cash generating

unit (CGU) is made. Recoverable amount is higher of an asset's or cash generating unit's net selling price and its value in use. Value in use is the present value of estimated future cash flows expected to arise from the continuing use of an asset and from its disposal at the end of its useful life. For the purpose of assessing impairment, the recoverable amount is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets. The smallest identifiable group of assets that generates cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets, is considered as a cash generating unit (CGU). An asset or CGU whose carrying value exceeds its recoverable amount is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount. Assessment is also done at each reporting date as to whether there is any indication that an impairment loss recognised for an asset in prior accounting periods may no longer exist or may have decreased.

(f) Government Grants and Subsidies

Grants and subsidies (including industrial investment promotion incentives linked to fixed capital investment in Property, Plant and Equipment, etc.) from the Government(s) are recognised when there is reasonable assurance that the conditions attached to them will be complied and grants/subsidies will be received. Government subsidies/incentives inextricably based upon and linked to fixed capital investments in Property, Plant and Equipment for setting up a new industrial undertaking or for substantial expansion/technological upgradation/diversification of an existing industrial undertaking where no repayment is stipulated are deducted from the carrying amount of Property, Plant and Equipment.

Export benefits availed as per prevalent schemes are accounted for in the year in which the goods are exported subject to the condition that there exists no significant uncertainty with regard to their ultimate collection.

(g) Inventories

Inventories are valued as follows:

Raw Materials, Stores, Spare Parts and Packing Material	Lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a transaction moving weighted average basis. However, raw materials and other items held for use in the production of inventories are not written down below cost if the finished products in which they will be incorporated are expected to be sold at or above cost.
Traded Goods	Lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on transaction moving weighted average basis.
Work-in-Progress and Finished Goods	Lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes direct materials (determined on a transaction moving weighted average basis), labour and a proportion of manufacturing overheads based on normal operating capacity of relevant production facilities.
Scrap Materials	Estimated Net Realisable Value.

Cost comprise all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated cost of completion and estimated cost necessary to make the sale.

(h) Fair Value Measurement

The Company measures financial instruments such as investment and derivatives at fair value at each balance sheet date.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- (i) In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- (ii) In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability to which the Company has access at that date.

All assets and liabilities for which fair value is measured or disclosed in the standalone financial statements are categorised within the fair value hierarchy, described as follows, based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement as a whole:

- Level 1- Quoted (unadjusted) market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- Level 2- Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is directly or indirectly observable;

Level 3- Valuation techniques for which the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement is unobservable.

For the purpose of fair value disclosure, the Company has determined classes of assets and liabilities on the basis of nature, characteristics and risks of the assets or liabilities and the level of the fair value hierarchy as explained above.

Management determines the policies and procedures for both recurring fair value measurement, such as derivative instruments and unquoted financial assets and for non-recurring measurement, such as assets held for disposal.

(i) Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

(1) Financial Assets

(a) Initial Recognition and Measurement

All financial assets are initially recognized at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and liabilities, which are not fair value through profit and loss, are adjusted to the fair value on initial recognition. However, trade receivable that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

(b) Subsequent Measurement

Financial Assets other than Equity Instruments

(i) Financial Assets carried at Amortised cost:

A financial asset is subsequently measured at amortized cost if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold the asset in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on principal outstanding. Interest income from these financial assets is included in other income using the effective rate interest ("EIR") method.

(ii) Financial Assets at Fair value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVTOCI):

A financial asset is subsequently measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if it is held within a business model whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows and selling financial assets and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on principal outstanding. They are subsequently measured at each reporting date at fair value, with all fair value movements recognised in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI). On de-recognition of the asset, cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in Other Comprehensive Income is reclassified from the OCI to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

(iii) Financial Asset at Fair Value through Profit or Loss (FVTPL):

A financial asset which is not classified in any of the above categories are subsequently fair valued through profit and loss.

Equity Instruments

(i) Equity Instrument Valued at Cost:

The Company has accounted for its Investment in Subsidiary at cost.

(ii) Other Equity Investments

All other equity investments are measured at fair value. Equity Investments, which are held for trading are classified as Fair value through the Statement of Profit and Loss. For equity investments other than held for trading, the Company has exercised irrevocable option to recognise fair value changes in 'Other Comprehensive Income' ("OCI") save & except passive long-term investments in a power producer company for sourcing of renewable energy which are measured at cost by treating it as fair value through Profit and Loss (FVTPL) as per the governing terms and conditions of the Power Purchase Agreement (Refer Note No.4). The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis for those investments which are strategic and are not intended for sale. If the Company decides to classify an equity instrument as at FVTOCI, then all fair value changes on the instrument, excluding dividends, are recognised in the OCI. Gain/ losses on disposal of such investments are transferred from OCI to Retained Earnings.

(c) Derecognition of Financial Asset

The Company derecognizes financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or it transfers the financial asset and the transfer qualifies for de-recognition under Ind AS 109.

(d) Impairment of Financial Assets (Other than financial assets at fair value)

The Company assesses at each date of Balance Sheet whether a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Ind AS 109 requires expected credit losses to be measured through a loss allowance. The Company determines expected credit losses after taking into account the past history of recovery, risk of default of the counterparty, existing market conditions, etc. The impairment methodology is applied on individual customer basis and depends on whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition.

(2) Financial Liabilities

(a) Recognition and Initial Measurement:

Financial liabilities at initial recognition are classified at fair value through profit or loss, loans and borrowings, payables or as derivatives, as appropriate. All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of loans and borrowings and payables, net of directly attributable transaction costs.

(b) Subsequent Measurement:

Financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortized cost or FVTPL. A financial liability is classified as FVTPL if it is classified as held-for-trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. Financial liabilities at FVTPL are measured at fair value and net gains and losses, including any interest expense, are recognized in profit or loss. Other financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method. Interest expense and foreign exchange gains and losses are recognized in profit or loss. Any gain or loss on de-recognition is also recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

(c) Derecognition:

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expired.

(3) Offsetting Financial Instruments:

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Balance Sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(4) Derivative Financial Instruments:

The Company enters into derivative financial instruments viz. foreign exchange forward contracts and interest rate swaps and to manage its exposure to interest rate and foreign exchange rate risks. Derivatives are initially recognized at fair value on the date when the derivative contracts are entered into and are subsequently re-measured to their fair value at the end of each reporting period. The resulting gain or loss is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss immediately.

(j) Income Taxes

Tax expense comprises current income tax and deferred tax. Current income tax expense is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the taxation authorities in accordance with the governing provisions of the Income-Tax Act, 1961. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted, at the reporting date.

Deferred tax is provided using the balance sheet method on temporary differences between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes at the reporting date. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

Income tax (Current and Deferred) is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss except to the extent it relates to the items recognised directly in equity or other comprehensive income.

Current tax assets and Current tax liabilities are offset, if a legally enforceable right exists to set off the recognised amounts and where it intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

(k) Revenue from Contract with Customer

Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration entitled in exchange for those goods or services.

Revenue is measured at the value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractual terms and conditions. Taxes (GST) collected on behalf of the government are excluded from revenue. Revenue is recognized to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue and costs, if applicable, can be measured reliably. Revenue is disclosed net of returns and incentives, as applicable. Variable consideration includes volume discounts, price concessions, liquidated damages, incentives, etc. The Company estimates the variable consideration with respect to above based on an analysis of accumulated historical experience. The variable consideration is adjusted as and when the expectation regarding the same changes.

Performance obligation in case of Revenue from sale of goods is satisfied at a point in time and is recognized when control of goods is transferred to the customers. Generally, control is transferred upon shipment of goods to the customer or when the goods is made available to the customer, provided transfer of title to the customer occurs and the Company has not retained any significant risks of ownership or future obligations with respect to the goods shipped.

Services Income is recognised over the period as per the terms and conditions of the contract. Interest income is recognised on time proportion basis. Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

Export benefits availed as per the prevalent schemes are accrued each year in which the goods are exported and when no significant uncertainty exist regarding the ultimate collection.

(l) Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, production or development of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which they are incurred. Transaction cost in respect of long term borrowing are amortised over the tenure of respective loans using Effective Interest Rate (EIR) method.

(m) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

The Company recognises a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and reliable estimates can be made of the amount of obligation.

A disclosure of contingent liability is made when there is possible obligation or a present obligation that will probably not require outflow of resources or where a reliable estimate of the obligation cannot be made. Where there is a possible obligation or a present obligation and likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

Contingent assets are not recognized but disclosed in the standalone financial statements, where economic inflow is probable.

(n) Employee Benefits

Defined Contribution Plan

The Company makes regular contributions to recognised Provident Fund/Family Pension Fund and also to duly constituted and approved Superannuation Fund, which are recognised as expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss during the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Defined Benefit Scheme

Gratuity, Pension and Compensated Absences benefits, payable as per Company's schemes are considered as defined benefit schemes and are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss on the basis of actuarial valuation carried out at the end of each financial year by independent actuaries using Projected Unit Credit Method. For the purpose of presentation of defined benefit plans in the Balance sheet, the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date is netted off with the fair value of plan assets and allocated between current and non-current as determined by independent actuary. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised in the Other Comprehensive Income except actuarial gains and losses on compensated absences and pension benefits which are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Ex-gratia or other amount disbursed on account of selective employees separation scheme or otherwise are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss as and when incurred/determined.

(o) Leases

Where the Company is the Lessee:

The Company's lease asset class primarily consist of lease for building. The Company, at the inception of a contract, assesses whether the contract is a lease or not a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a time in exchange for a consideration. The Company has elected not to recognize Right-of-use Assets and lease liabilities for short-term leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets and the corresponding lease rental paid are directly charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss Account. The Company recognizes the lease payments associated with these leases as an expense over the lease term. The Company recognises a Right-of-use Asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The Right-of-use Asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial costs incurred. The Right-of-use Asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term. The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the Company's incremental borrowing rate. Subsequently, lease liabilities are measured on amortised cost basis.

(p) Foreign Currency Translations

Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded in the functional currency, by applying to the foreign currency amount the exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary items are translated using the exchange rate prevailing at the reporting date.

(q) Segment Reporting - Identification of Segments:

An operating segment is a component of the Company that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, whose operating results are regularly reviewed by the company's Chief Operating Decision Maker ("CODM") to make decisions for which discrete financial information is available. Based on the management approach as defined in Ind AS 108, the CODM evaluates the Company's performance and allocates resources based on an analysis of various performance indicators by business segments and geographic segments

(r) Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share are calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the year attributable to equity shareholders of the company by the weighted average number of the equity shares outstanding during the year.

For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, net profit or loss attributable to equity shareholders of the Company and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year is adjusted for the effect of all dilutive potential equity shares.

(s) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash equivalent in the Cash Flow Statement comprises cash on hand, demand deposits with banks and short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

(t) Recent Pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. For the year ended March 31, 2025, MCA has notified Ind AS – 117 Insurance Contracts and amendments to Ind AS 116 – Leases, relating to sale and leaseback transactions, applicable to the Company w.e.f. April 1, 2024. The Company has reviewed the new pronouncements and based on its evaluation has determined that it does not have any significant impact in its financial statements.

45. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES:

The Company's activities are exposed to a variety of Financial Risks from its Operations. The key financial risks include Market risk, Credit risk and Liquidity risk.

(a) Market Risk:

Market Risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market Risk comprises mainly three types of Risk: Foreign Currency Risk, Interest Rate Risk, Other Price Risk such as Commodity Price Risk and Equity Price Risk.

(i) Foreign Currency Risk:

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of an exposure will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The Company is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from foreign currency transactions of imports, exports and borrowing primarily with respect to USD, EURO, GBP, AED and CNY. The Company's exports are denominated generally in USD and EURO, providing a natural hedge to some extent against foreign currency payments on account of imports of raw materials and/or the payment of borrowings. The foreign currency transaction risk are managed through selective hedging programmes by way of forward contracts including for underlying transactions having firm commitments or highly probable forecast of crystallisation.

The Company uses forward exchange contracts to hedge its exposure in foreign currency. The details of foreign currency exposures hedged by derivative instruments and those have not been hedged are as follows:

(iii) Commodity Price Risk:

The Company is affected by the price volatility of certain commodities. Its operating activities require the purchase of raw material for manufacturing of Cables and therefore, require a continuous supply of certain raw materials such as optical fibre, plastic and polymers, copper etc. To mitigate the commodity price risk, the company has an approved supplier base to get the best competitive prices for the commodities and to manage the cost without any compromise on quality.

(iv) Equity Price Risk:

The Company's exposure to equity instruments price risk arises from investments held by the company and classified in the Balance Sheet at Fair Value through OCI. Having regard to the nature of securities, intrinsic worth, intent and long term nature of investment in securities held by the company, fluctuation in their prices are considered acceptable and do not warrant any management estimation.

(b) Credit Risk:
(i) Trade Receivables/Corporate Guarantee

The Company has an established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. The Company assesses the credit quality of the counterparties taking into account their financial position, past experience and other factors. Some of the customers are Government owned entities and private telecom sector operators. Credit risk is reduced to a significant extent if the supplies are part of a project which is funded by the Central / State Government. Outstanding customer receivables are regularly monitored and assessed. At the end of the reporting period, there were no significant concentrations of credit risk expected in outstanding receivable.

The lenders assesses the credit quality of Vindhya Telelinks Limited and after considering its financial position, intrinsic value, its business profile and future prospects, Credit risk is low. The Company has also accepted corporate guarantee from Vindhya Telelinks Limited (Cross Corporate Guarantee) against total credit facilities and term loan(s) availed from consortium of banks.

(ii) Deposits with Bank:

The fixed deposits with banks predominantly comprises of margin money against bank guarantees, letter(s) of credit, etc. as per the terms of sanction of non fund based credit facilities.

(c) Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk, where the Company may encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The Company's approach is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due.

Opinion

1. 5. The Holding Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual report but does not include the consolidated financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the consolidated financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the consolidated financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed and the reports of the other auditors as furnished to us (refer paragraph 14 below), we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Managements and Board of Directors' Responsibility for the Consolidated Financial Statements

6. The Holding Company's Management and Board of Directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view of the consolidated state of affairs, consolidated profit and other comprehensive income, consolidated changes in equity and consolidated cash flows of the Group in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) specified under section 133 of the Act. The respective Management and Board of Directors of the Companies included in the Group are responsible for maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the each Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls that were operating effectively for ensuring accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the consolidated financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, which have been used for the purpose of preparation of Consolidated Financial Statements by the Management and Directors of the Holding Company, as aforesaid.
7. In preparing the consolidated financial statements, the respective Management and Board of Directors of the companies included in the Group are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the respective Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.
8. The respective Board of Directors of the Companies included in the Group are responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process of each Company.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

9. Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these consolidated financial statements.
10. As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:
 - Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
 - Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under section 143(3)(i) of the Act, we are also responsible for expressing our opinion on whether the Holding Company, has adequate internal financial controls system in place and the operating effectiveness of such controls.
 - Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures in the consolidated financial statements made by the Management and Board of Directors.
 - Conclude on the appropriateness of the Management and Board of Directors use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the consolidated financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Group to cease to continue as a going concern.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the consolidated financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the consolidated financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.
 - Obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence regarding the financial information of the entities or business activities within the Group of which we are the independent auditors, to express an opinion on the Consolidated Financial Statements. We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audit of the financial statements of such entities included in the Consolidated Financial Statements of which we are the independent auditors. For the other entities included in the Consolidated Financial Statements, which have been audited by other auditors, such other auditors remain responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the audits carried out by them. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.
11. We communicate with those charged with governance of the Holding Company and such other entities included in the Consolidated Financial Statements of which we are the independent auditors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
 12. We also provide those charged with governance with a statement that we have complied with relevant ethical requirements regarding independence, and to communicate with them all relationships and other matters that may reasonably be thought to bear on our independence, and where applicable, related safeguards.
 13. From the matters communicated with those charged with governance, we determine those matters that were of most significance in the audit of the consolidated financial statements of the current period and are therefore the key audit matters. We describe these matters in our auditor's report unless law or regulation precludes public disclosure about the matter or when, in extremely rare circumstances, we determine that a matter should not be communicated in our report because the adverse consequences of doing so would reasonably be expected to outweigh the public interest benefits of such communication.

Other Matter

14. We did not audit the financial statement of an subsidiary whose financial statements (before consolidation adjustments) reflect total assets of ₹ 36.49 lakhs as at 31 March 2025, total revenues of ₹ 47.76 lakhs, total net profit after tax (including other comprehensive income) of ₹ (-) 11.87 lakhs, and net cash inflows amounting to ₹ (-) 13.87 lakhs for the year ended on that date, as considered in the consolidated financial statements, which have been audited by other auditor whose report have been furnished to us by the management.

This subsidiary which is located outside India whose financial statements and other financial information have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in that country ('local GAAP') and which have been audited by other auditor under generally accepted auditing standards applicable in that country. The Holding Company's management has converted the financial statements of this subsidiary from local GAAP to accounting principles generally accepted in India. We have audited these conversion adjustments made by the Holding Company's management. Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, in so far as it relates to the amounts and disclosures included in respect of this subsidiary, and our report in terms of sub-section (3) of section 143 of the Act, in so far as it relates to the aforesaid subsidiary, is based solely on the report of the other auditor and certified converted financial statement by management.

Our opinion on the consolidated financial statements, and our report on other legal and regulatory requirements below, is not modified in respect of the above matter with respect to our reliance on the work done and the report of the other auditor.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

15. According to the information and explanations given to us and based on our examination, there are no companies included in the consolidated financial statements of the Holding Company which are companies incorporated in India except the Holding Company. The Companies (Auditor's Report) Order, 2020 of the Holding Company did not include any unfavorable answers or qualifications or adverse remarks.
16. As required by Section 143(3) of the Act, based on our audit and based on the consideration as noted in the 'Other Matters' paragraph, above we report, to the extent applicable, that:
 - (a) We/the other auditor whose report we have relied upon have sought and obtained all the information and explanations which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit of the aforesaid Consolidated Financial Statements;
 - (b) In our opinion, proper books of account as required by law relating to preparation of the aforesaid Consolidated Financial Statements have been kept so far as it appears from our examination of those books and the reports of the other auditors;
 - (c) The Consolidated Balance Sheet, the Consolidated statement of Profit and Loss (including other comprehensive income), the Consolidated statement of changes in equity and the Consolidated statement of Cash Flows dealt with by this Report are in agreement with the books of account maintained for the purpose of preparation of the Consolidated Financial Statements;

- (d) In our opinion, the aforesaid Consolidated Financial Statements comply with the Ind AS specified under section 133 of the Act.
- (e) On the basis of the written representations received from the directors of the Holding Company as on 31 March 2025 taken on record by the Board of Directors of the Holding Company, none of the directors is disqualified as on 31 March 2025 from being appointed as a director in terms of Section 164 (2) of the Act.
- (f) With respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of the Holding Company and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate report in “Annexure A”;
- (g) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor’s Report in accordance with the requirements of section 197(16) of the Act, as amended: In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the managerial remuneration paid by the Holding Company to its directors during the year is in accordance with the provisions of Section 197 of the Act.
- (h) With respect to the other matters to be included in the Auditor’s Report in accordance with Rule 11 of the Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014 (as amended), in our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us and based on the consideration as noted in the ‘Other Matters’ paragraph:
- (i) The Consolidated Financial Statements disclose the impact of pending litigations as at 31 March, 2025 on the consolidated financial position of the Group – Refer to Note 36 to the Consolidated Financial Statements;
- (ii) The Group did not have any long-term contracts including derivative contracts for which there were any material foreseeable losses;
- (iii) There were no amounts which were required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund by the Holding Company.
- (iv) (a) The Management has represented that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been advanced or loaned or invested (either from borrowed funds or share premium or any other sources or kind of funds) by the Holding Company to or in any other person or entity, including foreign entity (“Intermediaries”), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Intermediary shall, whether, directly or indirectly lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Company (“Ultimate Beneficiaries”) or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries;
- (b) The Management has represented, that, to the best of its knowledge and belief, no funds (which are material either individually or in the aggregate) have been received by the Holding Company from any person or entity, including foreign entity (“Funding Parties”), with the understanding, whether recorded in writing or otherwise, that the Company shall, whether, directly or indirectly, lend or invest in other persons or entities identified in any manner whatsoever by or on behalf of the Funding Party (“Ultimate Beneficiaries”) or provide any guarantee, security or the like on behalf of the Ultimate Beneficiaries.
- (c) Based on the audit procedures that have been considered reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances, nothing has come to our notice that has caused us to believe that the representations under sub-clause (i) and (ii) of Rule 11(e) of Companies (Audit and Auditors) Rules, 2014, as provided under (a) and (b) above, contain any material misstatement
- (v) (a) The final dividend proposed in the previous year, declared and paid by the Holding Company during the year is in accordance with section 123 of the Act;
- (b) The Board of Directors of the Holding Company have proposed a final dividend for the year which is subject to the approval of the members at the ensuing annual general meeting. The amount of dividend proposed is in accordance with section 123 of the Act.
- (vi) Based on our examination, which included test checks, the Holding Company has used accounting software for maintaining its books of account for the financial year ended 31st March, 2025 which has a feature of recording audit trail (edit log) facility and the same has operated throughout the year for all relevant transactions recorded in the software. Further, during the course of our audit we did not come across any instance of the audit trail feature being tampered with and the audit trail has been preserved by the Holding Company as per the statutory requirements for record retention.

(b) General Reserve

The General Reserve represents free reserve being an appropriation of profit/retained earnings and kept aside to meet the future requirements as and when they arise. Mandatory transfer to general reserve is not required under the Companies Act, 2013. As the general reserve is created by transfer from one component of equity to another and is not an item of other comprehensive income, items included in the general reserve are not reclassified subsequent to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

(c) Retained Earnings

Retained Earnings represents the amount of accumulated profits of the Company.

(d) Other Comprehensive Income (OCI)

OCI represents the variation in the amount of equity instruments valued at fair value through other comprehensive income. 1. NOTES TO CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH, 2025
1.1 Company Overview

Birla Cable Limited (B Cab) (“the Company”) is a public limited listed company incorporated under the Companies Act, 1956 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2013). The Company is engaged in manufacturing and sale of Cables (comprising of telecommunications cables, other types of wires & cables, etc.). The registered office of the Company is located at Udyog Vihar, P.O. Chorhata, Rewa- 486006 (M.P.), India and its CIN No. is L31300MP1992PLC007190.

The Consolidated Financial Statements were approved by the Board of Directors of the Company in their meeting held on 21st May, 2025. The Consolidated Financial Statements as at 31st March, 2025 represent the financial position of the Company (“Holding Company”) and its Subsidiary (collectively referred as ‘Group’). 1.2 Basis of Preparation and Presentation

The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with and to comply in all material aspects with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as notified under the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act), Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and other relevant provisions of the Act, as applicable.

The Consolidated Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual and going concern basis under historical cost convention, except for the items that have been measured at fair value as required by relevant Ind AS.

The Consolidated Financial Statements are presented in Indian Rupees, which is also its functional currency. All amounts in the financial statements and accompanying notes are presented in lakhs (Indian Rupees) and have been rounded-off to two decimal places in accordance with the provisions of Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013, unless stated otherwise.

1.3 Basis of Consolidation

The Financial Statements of the Holding Company and its subsidiary have been consolidated on a line by line basis by adding together the book value of like items of assets, liabilities, income and expenses, after eliminating intra-group balances, intra-group transactions and unrealised profits or losses, if any, in accordance with Ind AS 110 – “Consolidated Financial Statements”.

1.4 Summary of Material Accounting Policies

The Accounting Policies of the Holding Company and its Subsidiary are largely similar and significant Accounting Policies of the Consolidated Financial Statements are as given in the Standalone Financial Statements.

43. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES:

The Group activities are exposed to a variety of Financial Risks from its Operations. The key financial risks include Market risk, Credit risk and Liquidity risk.

(a) Market Risk:

Market Risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market Risk comprises mainly three types of Risk: Foreign Currency Risk, Interest Rate Risk, Other Price Risk such as Commodity Price Risk and Equity Price Risk.

(i) Foreign Currency Risk:

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of an exposure will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The Holding Company is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from foreign currency transactions of imports, exports and borrowing primarily with respect to USD, EURO, GBP, CNY and AED. The Holding Company's exports are denominated generally in USD and EURO, providing a natural hedge to some extent against foreign currency payments on account of imports of raw materials and/or the payment of borrowings. The foreign currency transaction risk are managed through selective hedging programmes by way of forward contracts including for underlying transactions having firm commitments or highly probable forecast of crystallisation.

The Holding Company uses forward exchange contracts to hedge its exposure in foreign currency. The details of foreign currency exposures hedged by derivative instruments and those have not been hedged are as follows:

(iii) Commodity Price Risk:

The Holding Company is affected by the price volatility of certain commodities. Its operating activities require the purchase of raw material for manufacturing of Cables and therefore, require a continuous supply of certain raw materials such as optical fibre, plastic and polymers, copper etc. To mitigate the commodity price risk, the Holding Company has an approved supplier base to get the best competitive prices for the commodities and to manage the cost without any compromise on quality.

(iv) Equity Price Risk:

The Holding Company's exposure to equity instruments price risk arises from investments held by the Holding Company and classified in the Balance Sheet at Fair Value through OCI. Having regard to the nature of securities, intrinsic worth, intent and long term nature of investment in securities held by the company, fluctuation in their prices are considered acceptable and do not warrant any management estimation.

(b) Credit Risk:

(i) Trade Receivables/Corporate Guarantee

The Holding Company has an established policy, procedures and control relating to customer credit risk management. The Holding Company assesses the credit quality of the counterparties taking into account their financial position, past experience and other factors. Some of the customers are Government owned entities and private telecom sector operators. Credit risk is reduced to a significant extent if the supplies are part of a project which is funded by the Central/State Government. Outstanding customer receivables are regularly monitored and assessed. Impairment allowance for trade receivables if any, is provided on the basis of respective credit risk of individual customer as on the reporting date.

The lenders assesses the credit quality of Vindhya Telelinks Limited and after considering its financial position, intrinsic value, its business profile and future prospects, Credit risk is low. The Holding Company has also accepted corporate guarantee from Vindhya Telelinks Limited (Cross Corporate Guarantee) against total credit facilities and term loan(s) availed from consortium of banks.

(ii) Deposits with Bank:

The fixed deposits with banks predominantly comprises of margin money against bank guarantees, letter(s) of credit, etc. as per the terms of sanction of non fund based credit facilities.

(c) Liquidity Risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk, where the Holding Company may encounter difficulty in meeting the obligations associated with its financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset. The Holding Company's approach is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will have sufficient liquidity to meet its liabilities when due.

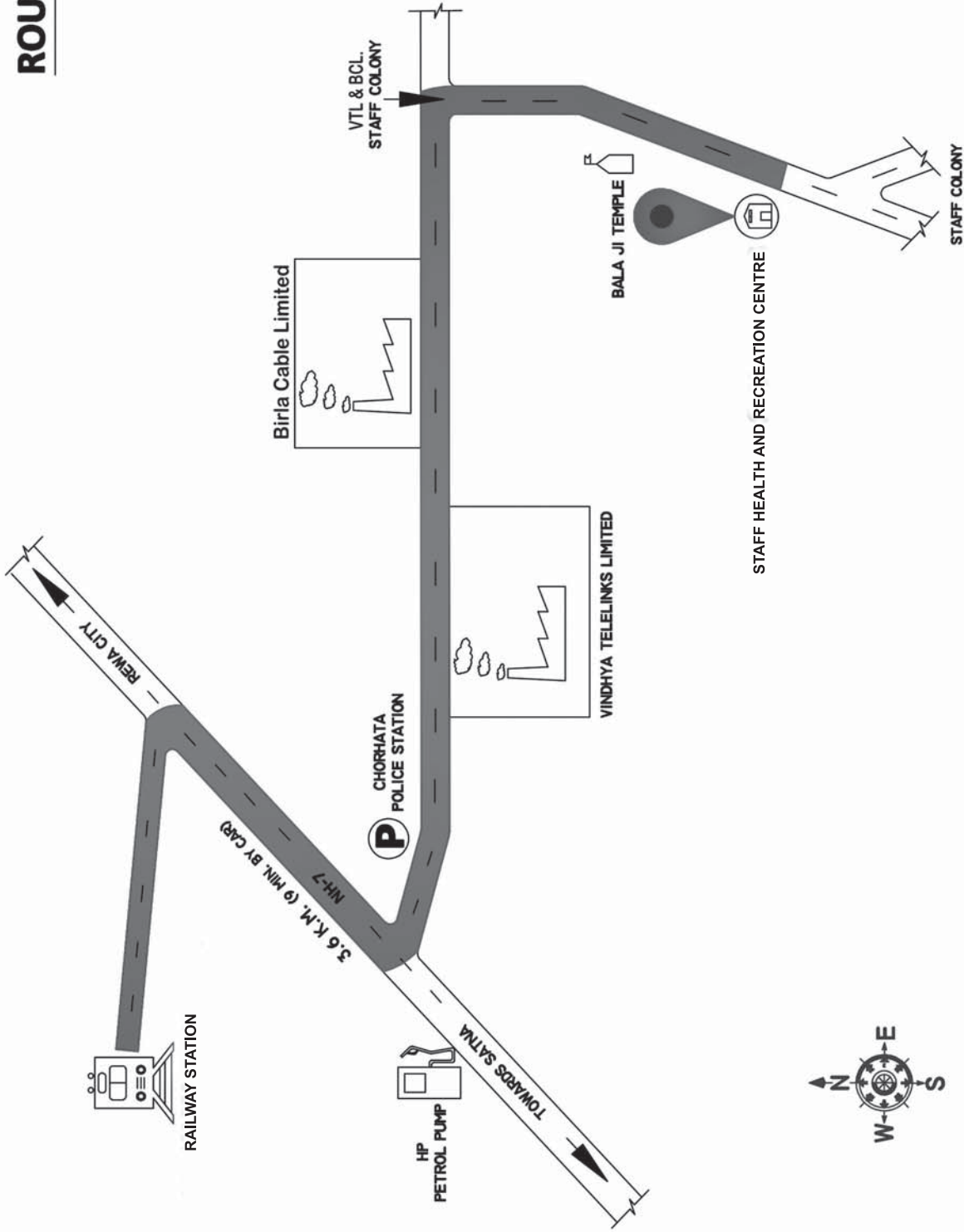

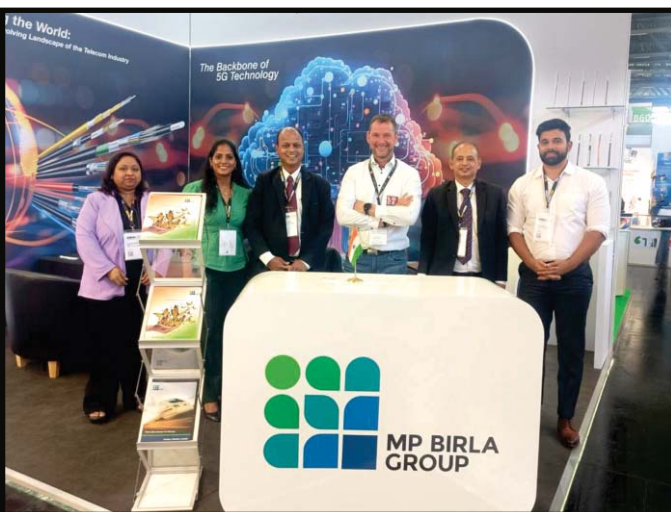
